We were so blessed to be part of a wide community of welcoming refugees! The Zomi Christian Church, KRM, and members of First Christian, First Presbyterian and Bardstown Road Presbyterian were all present to welcome the Khat Khai family. We greeted them with balloons, signs, stuffed animals, and flowers AND lots of enthusiasm. After we had shaken hands with over 10 people, we started worrying that we didn't have enough beds. It turns out there were 2 families arriving and that Catholic Charities was welcoming the second family. Glad we had enthusiasm for both families and that we had enough stuffed animals for both families!!

The family of 8 (Khat, Zen, Don, Suam, Mung, Vung, Hau, and Cing) are originally from Myanmar. The Zomi ethnic group has been discriminated against because of their ethnicity and religion (Christian). Khat left Myanmar in 2007 and has lived as a refugee for the last 11 years in Malaysia. The rest of the family joined him in 2012. So we are happy to welcome them into their home at 121 East Woodlawn Ave in Louisville. Thank you to everyone who provided furniture, supplies, and helped financially. A resounding thank you to all of you who helped get the house ready - a hot sweaty and dirty task!!

We have recently had the opportunity to introduce them to the waterfront in downtown Louisville and very much enjoyed the outing. We learned that Hau (12 year old daughter) won first place in the Zomi Idol competition in 2016. She is hoping to continue singing!



A Place to Sleep

-127 children have received beds in 2018 making a grand total of 1586 children, with 85 on the waiting list. -There have been many volunteers during the June which include our own youth as a Bible school activity who helped sort and fold baby blankets. Youth from Harvey Brown Presbyterian Church, Highland Presbyterian Church, and Beulah Presbyterian Church all spent time helping. A group from 1st Baptist Church from Morristown, Tennessee returned again this year to help deliver beds.

-A Place to Sleep is registered for "Give for Good Louisville" which occurs on September 13. Jessica Collins and Lynn Whittaker will be attending a training session to discover ways to increase donations.

-The next delivery date will be July 29 with the help of Christ Community Church on their "Love Shelbyville" day.

Serenity Center

Our next Wednesday to help distribute food at the Serenity Center on 7th Street is August 1, the first Wednesday of each month. Volunteers need to be at least 16 years old or old enough to work with little supervision and accompanied by an adult. Carlen Pippin has been sharing extra food with God's Kitchen, Father's Love, Colonial Hall, the Women's Renaissance Center, and A Loving Choice Pregnancy Center.

We have helped 137 children so far in 2018, making a grand total of 1,596 since December 2009. And, as it always is, there are 71 children on the waiting list. To serve these 71 children and the expected 41 additional through the end of the year, we will need to raise some money, lots of money, around \$25,000 just to purchase the frames, mattresses and foundations.


