Food insecurity refers to the USDA's measure of lack of regular access to nutritional food for an active and healthy life. According to Dare to Care, during 2016, the food insecurity rate in Shelby County was 11.5% of the total population or 5,100 people. The child (under age 18) food insecurity rate was 15.1% or 1.620 children.

Hard to believe, but there are kids in our community who are only eating at school. As a community, we have rallied around this gap by creating The Backpack Project. As a result, backpacks filled with food go home with kids every Friday and sustain them throughout the weekend. The Shelby County Backpack Program provides supplemental meals for Shelby County students during weekends, fall break, winter break, and spring break. Without the backpack program, these children may not have the means to eat any meals while they are not at school. (Wonder if and/or how they are getting enough to eat during the recent snow days when school is out unexpectedly?)

The Souper Bowl of Caring utilizes Super Bowl weekend in America to mobilize young people to fight hunger and poverty in their local communities. Its vision is to transform Super Bowl weekend (the weekend of the first Sunday in February) into America's largest youth-led weekend of giving and serving. Young people collect monetary and food donations during the week leading up to Super Bowl Sunday. 100% of the money and food is then given directly to local charities of the group's choice.

Started at Spring Valley Presbyterian Church in Columbia, South Carolina, the Souper Bowl of Caring has branched out to include schools, businesses and congregations of all faiths. Together, they have raised more than \$50 million in monetary and food donations. In 2008 alone, more than 14,000 groups collected over \$10 million.

The Souper Bowl of Caring has gained national attention, securing partnerships with nine different NFL Teams, in addition to finding National Advocates in former President and Mrs George H.W. Bush and former President and Mrs Jimmy Carter.^[4]

In honor of the Super Bowl on Sunday, February 4, we are hosting a Souper Bowl Challenge to aid the Shelby County Backpack Project. Bring canned soups with flip tops, individual servings of crackers or chips, single serve Jello and pudding, Poptarts, etc. Use your item to vote for the NFL or AFC. No matter who wins the game, the children will be the recipients of our fun.

"Lord, even as we enjoy the Super Bowl football game, help us be mindful of those who are without a bowl of soup to eat."



COMMUNITY ASSISTANCE

Two families were helped with electricity this month.

ADOPTED FAMILY

Eggs are not available from the adopted family since the hens are not laying since it is so cold.

A PLACE TO SLEEP

1,460 children have received beds with 266 in 2017. There are 77 on the waiting list. Christ Community Church has volunteered to help on each of their Love Shelbyville days if needed. (Love Shelbyville days are normally the 4th Sunday of each month.)

GIVE A KID A BRIGHTER DAY

Cadence Collins provided pajamas and books for 75-80 children in our Christmas baskets. She has submitted this project in hopes of receiving a Youth Service America (YSA) Kindness Rising grant.

SERENITY CENTER

This church volunteers at the Serenity Center, 98 7th Street, the first Wednesday of each month, 12-4pm. Feel free to volunteer any Wednesday. They also need volunteers to help pick up donations from stores (Walmart, Kroger, etc.) and to help at Dare to Care in Louisville for a few hours once a month. Anyone interested in helping at Dare to Care with no long-term commitment may call the Serenity Center at 647-5555. Carpooling available.

MUSICAL INSTRUMENT PROGRAM

The Musical Instrument Program was started several years ago with the mission of providing musical instruments for students who were unable to rent or purchase one of their own. The instruments are donated to the church and given to the Shelby County Public Schools where any repairs are made. They remain the property of the school systemand are loaned to students under the supervision of the band/orchestra instructors. With **100** instruments placed in the schools to date, Gary Steinhilber, director of the program, is still accepting donations. He placed a notice on the Community page of the Sentinel News which has received a good response.

GOD'S KITCHEN

This church also volunteers at God's Kitchen, a local soup kitchen operated out of Victory Baptist Church, 715 Main Street, on the 2nd Thursday of each month. On January 11, Meme Lafferty, Lucy Long and Susie Phillips provided desserts. Meme also brought cornbread to accompany Boyd Phillips' soup beans and Gary Steinhilber's potato soup. Leftovers were taken to Colonial Hall. The next day for us to serve at God's Kitchen will be February 8. Anyone with desserts should bring them to the church by 10:00 am and those wishing to help serve should be at Victory Baptist by 10:30 am.

SALVATION ARMY KETTLES

A Place to Sleep


Jessica never dreamed there would still be children without decent beds. It's been a little over eight years now, and God continues to allow A Place to Sleep to bless and serve. 1,460 children have received beds with 266 in 2017. There are 77 on the waiting list. Having already helped one child in 2018, we are gearing up to set dates for out-of-county pickups and in-county deliveries. Christ Community Church has graciously offered to help with anything we need on each of their Love Shelbyville days again this year. January's date is Sunday, January 28 when, weather and funds permitting, they will help us deliver beds. They are also praying for us daily.



Current needs are for twin sheet sets and comforters, funds to purchase mattresses and frames, and a church, group or business in Jefferson County to provide transportation for families there with no means to pick up their beds. That has been a huge barrier for families. Some Family Resource Center staff, Family & Children's Place, and our own Collins High School Football Coaches have helped, but we really need a consistent provider, say once a month or once a quarter, to take a load of beds to Jefferson County. If you have any connections or ideas, please let us know.

We continue to be blessed by Awake Ministry. Just being in the same building, sharing concerns and ideas, working together to help many of the same families is a gift from God. The men and women in the recovery houses help us whenever time permits (they have very full schedules), and it is always with a hug and a smile. They encourage us!

We are also blessed with a wonderful Board of Directors and congregation who allow us to "do our thing" while being there to help sort out any problems or jump in when help is needed. *THANK YOU*.







Each year beginning on February 1, an entire month of **1 JOHN 3:18, NRSV** events are planned nationwide honoring the history and contributions of African Americans.

The theme for Black History Month in 2018 is "African Americans in Times of War" honoring those brave men and women who served their countries in the armed forces, especially those who made the ultimate sacrifice while

defending the American ideals of freedom and democracy.

During World War II, for example, more than 2.5 million black men registered for the draft and one million served as draftees or volunteers in every branch of the armed forces. A decade before the first glimmers of the American civil rights movement, most black men were assigned to segregated combat groups.

Even so, more than 12,000 black men who served in the segregated 92nd Division received citations or were decorated for "extraordinary heroism" on the battlefield. Perhaps more famously, the Tuskegee Airmen also became legendary for their heroic feats, and in total received a Distinguished Unit Citation, several silver stars, 150 distinguished flying crosses, fourteen bronze stars, and 744 air medals.

At war's end, recognition of the African-American contribution to the war effort would eventually lay the groundwork for the civil rights protests of the 1950s and 1960s.

Ash Wednesday is Valentine's Day this year: How should Christians celebrate?

CLEVELAND, Ohio - Having a romantic Valentine's Day dinner might be a bit complicated for Christians this year. School Valentine's parties might see some changes, too. For the first time since 1945, Valentine's Day and Ash Wednesday will fall on the same day.

Ash Wednesday is a somber occasion that marks the beginning of the 40-day period of Lent observed by Roman Catholics, Anglicans, Lutherans, Methodists, Presbyterians and other Protestant faiths. On this day, Christians attend services and receive ashes upon their forehead, usually with the words "*Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return*."

It is an official day of fasting for practicing Catholics and Anglicans. For Catholics, it is a particularly observant day, with fasting and abstinence for those between the ages of 14 and 59. That means only one full, non-meat meal should be eaten all day, accompanied by two smaller meals (that don't add up to the full meal). So, while you could still skip lunch and go out for that candlelight lobster dinner and be following the letter of the law, it's not necessarily in the spirit of the day. "We see this day as a full and solemn observation of the start of Lent," says Bob Tayek, Director of Media and Public Relations for the Cleveland Catholic Diocese.

For this reason, the Diocese is sending a recommendation to local Catholic Schools that they move Valentine's Day parties to another date that week as a way to keep the day solemn. "We're recommending a combined Valentine's Day/Mardi Gras celebration the day before," says Tayek.

They're recommending adult Catholics also celebrate another day that week, too. "Fat Tuesday, Mardi Gras, Paczki Day, whatever you call it, that's a day to go out and celebrate already," says Tayek. One local restaurateur says when Valentine's Day falls mid-week, many postpone their celebrations anyway. "Usually people will celebrate Valentine's Day when it is in the middle of the week the weekend before or the weekend after," notes Terry Tarantino, owner of La Dolce Vita restaurant in Little Italy. "I suppose most Catholics will be celebrating the weekend before, or the weekend after, depending on what they decide to give up for Lent."

For the record, St. Valentine, a third-century Roman martyr, IS a recognized saint in the Roman Catholic Church, even if February 14 has not been observed as his Saint's Day since 1969. Since so little is known about his life besides the fact he was martyred, he was removed from the official calendar. He still sells a lot of greeting cards, though.

dom-minded events hosted by Bible teacher and best-selling author, Jennifer Rothschild, meant to connect women in local churches with one another to reach their community.




