Frequently Asked Questions about the Presbyterian Worship Service

Other churches often have the sermon at the end of the service. Does the sermon have to be in the middle of the service? Why?

Everything we Presbyterians <u>do</u>, whether in worship or in the world, is supposed to center around the Gospel of Jesus Christ (the Word). It is only appropriate that our worship should be built around the same Scripture that tells us all about this Gospel of Christ. Our Call to Worship, Opening hymn, and Prayer of Confession prepare us to receive the inspiration of the Holy Spirit as the Word is proclaimed. The "Time for Silent Reflection", "Hymn of Response" (second hymn following the sermon), the Offering, and the Sacraments (baptism and communion, when they are offered), are all responses to hearing the Gospel proclaimed. We sing because we have heard the reason to sing; we give because we have heard the reason to

give; we accept the grace of God through our sacraments because we have heard the call from God to accept it. To put any of these before the Gospel would serve to disconnect our response from the very thing to which we are responding.

Why do we say our confession out loud? Why can't we just say our confession in silence?

We of the Reformed Faith (this includes Presbyterians) understand that the Church Universal is a community in and of itself – connecting us all together through the working of the Holy Spirit. And even though the church is called into being by God, it is not perfect and is indeed in need of forgiveness. The part of the confession we read together is a confession of the sins of the whole church, not of the individual. Now, because they are sins of the whole community of faith, we understand to have a hand in these sins in some sense and so by our confessing we help the Church in general with its sin.

After the Confession, why do we "pass the peace" as a part of the service?

It's not just a second time to say hello to your neighbors. It's much more than that. If you'll note, we pass the peace among the congregation right after the Confession and Assurance of Pardon. There really is a reason for it's being here. Throughout the Old and New Testaments we are taught that before we come before God, we need to be reconciled with our sisters and brothers in faith. After corporately and personally confessing our wrongs to God, we are given the opportunity to reconcile ourselves with those who are worshipping around us. It may be seem like we are breaking the flow of the worship service but we are actually participating in worship as we pass the peace of Christ among the Body of Christ.

What are the Sacraments of Baptism and Communion actually?


They are a symbolic representation of something that is very real and actively happening to those of us who participate in the Sacraments. We cannot see what God is *actually* doing because we are merely mortal and confined to the senses of the physical world. So God has given us these two Sacraments that use objects of the physical world to show us what God is doing for us and to us in spiritual sense.

In baptism, when we see the water poured over another (whether infant or adult), we are shown in that symbolic act what God *actually <u>does</u>*. God <u>does</u> seal us with God's name, marking us as God's child. God actually <u>does</u> wash our sin away...actually <u>does</u> have us die with Christ and raised to new life. We do baptism only once because if God has already sealed us with God's name, we do not actually need another "sealing".

The same goes for communion. When we eat the bread and drink the grape juice or wine, God actually does feed us with the spiritual food of Christ. God give us nourishment for our soul's sake and we are actually made stronger in spirit each time we partake of communion. In this case we offer communion as much as possible so that our very souls are strengthen all the more for discipleship.



Happy New Year!

I pray that you entered 2018 filled with joy and peace. We spent a few days enjoying Lake Malawi as a family and 2018 seemed to enter in quietly. Now here we are already a month later!

When Jeremy and I first moved to Malawi, we were struck by the deforestation that has devastated Malawi and the poor soils we saw everywhere. Regular flooding (as a result of the hard soil and deforestation) causing significant damage to homes, crops and lives occurs each rainy season even while the rains are sporadic at best. This leads to food insecurity and hunger which is directly connected to the malnutrition rate of 64% in children under 5. You cannot escape issues of hunger and farming in Malawi – it is an ever present topic of conversation. How many bags of maize did you harvest this year? How are the rains in your area? If God would only have mercy on us and send the rains, we are suffering.

While the work we do with CCAP is not directly related to agriculture, it has become our side interest – just like every Malawian you meet has a maize field somewhere, we have our little piece of land in our yard that we cultivate. Since arriving in Malawi we have been watching, listening and learning from individuals in Malawi who practice permaculture. Google describes permaculture as "the development of agricultural ecosystems intended to be sustainable and self-sufficient". Those who practice permaculture in Malawi speak of the abundance of food available in Malawi, and the amazing indigenous food resources, if people would look beyond maize as being the only food available. Even in periods of sporadic rains, such as what we are experiencing now, people who implement permaculture techniques have plenty of food to spare.

Jeremy and I have been particularly attracted to permaculture because of the foundational philosophies which mirror philosophies we follow in CHE and in pastoral care. There's a focus on using local resources, designing and building sustainable, holistic food systems and caring for people. Jeremy and I do not have backgrounds in agriculture, but we have seen how critical food systems are to the foundation of our work – lack of food security and food diversity directly impacts health which directly impacts spiritual and psychological well-being.

I yearn to use our garden as an example of the abundance that Malawi has to offer. But our attempts at gardening are slow going – our design is still in implementation phase, our garden is rife with aphids, when it rains water still stands on the ground and we are not maximizing our use of grey water. I still have so much to learn about indigenous plants. It is easy to become overwhelmed by it all. But my garden continues to be a place where God nudges me to deeper truths. I am reminded, that just as I must continually point people back to Christ who is author of our abundant lives, I should also continue to point people towards Malawians who have changed their lives through the implementation of

permaculture instead of trying to be at the center of people's interests. I am reminded that trying new things, failing, asking for help, and learning some more is in itself a witness to those around us of God's grace and creativity. And it puts me once again in the right place here in my home that is not my home, under the care of Malawians.

Finally it is good to celebrate the steps we have taken: Look at that yard! In September I sent a picture of our backyard that we have covered in mulch to heal and prepare the soil. Several of you have asked how our garden is doing. Things have really sprung to life with the rains, even sporadic as they have been this year. Look at that yard! We have more than enough for our family, and plenty to share. Our housekeeper and I processed our first batch of moringa powder right from our garden! The bird population and diversity has doubled. We are letting much of the yard lay still, and we are finding gems of local plants that have grown up. We have been picking up beer bottles from our neighborhood to edge some of our garden beds and meeting neighbors and building community in the process. Our garden and because of it, our lives are transforming, pang'ono pang'ono (little by little). I have said many times in many of our letters, the work of CHE is slow. The work of pastoral care, healing hearts is slow. But this slow, deep work will bring true healing and transformation to our hearts, minds, souls and soil!

I pray that God is also doing slow deep work in your lives and communities!






