125TH ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATION BY PASTOR JAY HODGE

On June 3rd, 1893, the building at the corner of 7th and Main Street was dedicated to the use of the Presbyterian Church for the glory of God. One and one-half years earlier, on Sunday morning, December 27, 1891, the former building was totally devastated by fire. Everything in the building was lost. However, during the interim time, the church maintained its vibrancy. By the Sunday of June 3rd, they were ready to celebrate.

We, too, will be celebrating on Sunday, June 3rd, 2018, the 125th anniversary of this Church's being in this building. We will begin with a special worship and luncheon that morning and begin a silent auction that will last throughout the day. Then, that evening, we will gather again in the Fellowship Hall for a BIRTHDAY PARTY!!!! Ice cream and cake will be served, songs sung, playful presentations presented, auction items will be awarded, and whatever else we may come up with that brings our joy to the surface!

There are four (4) points to this event that need as much help as they can get: 1) planning and executing the worship service; 2) providing and setting up for the food; 3) setting up a history display of this church's past; and, finally, 4) planning and executing the evening's birthday party/program. As of now, there are 10 folks who are committed to seeing this event through to fruition. If you wish to help out, the more the merrier and better the outcome. 






FROM THE HEART OF SOUTHSIDE TIGERS

Hepatitis A & What We Should Know

Hepatitis means inflammation of the liver. When the liver is inflamed or damaged, its function can be affected. Heavy alcohol use, toxins, some medications, and certain medical conditions can cause hepatitis, but a virus is often the cause. In the United States, the most common hepatitis viruses are hepatitis A virus, hepatitis B virus, and hepatitis C virus.

Hepatitis A is a highly contagious liver infection caused by the hepatitis A virus. It can range from a mild illness lasting a few weeks to a severe illness lasting several months. Most people who get hepatitis A feel sick for several weeks, but they usually recover completely and do not have lasting liver damage. In rare cases, hepatitis A can cause liver failure and death; this is more common in people older than 50 and in people with other liver diseases. Hepatitis A usually spreads when a person unknowingly ingests the virus from objects, food, or drinks contaminated by small, undetected amounts of stool from an infected person. Hepatitis A can also spread from close personal contact with an infected person such as through sex or caring for someone who is ill.

Contamination of food (this includes frozen and undercooked food) by hepatitis A can happen at any point: growing, harvesting, processing, handling, and even after cooking. Contamination of food or water is more likely to occur in countries where hepatitis A is common and in areas where there are poor sanitary conditions or poor personal hygiene.

Although anyone can get hepatitis A, in the United States, certain groups of people are at higher risk, such as;

- *People in direct contact with someone who has hepatitis A
- *Travelers to countries where hepatitis A is common
- *Men who have sexual contact with men
- *People who use drugs, both injection and non-injection drugs
- *Household members or caregivers of a recent adoptee from countries where hepatitis A is common
- *People with clotting factor disorders, such as hemophilia
- *People working with nonhuman primates

The best method to avoid contracting the hepatitis A virus is to receive the hepatitis A vaccine (a series of 2 shots, 6 months apart) which can be obtained from your medical professional or your local health department. THE USE OF HAND SANITIZER IS NOT EFFECTIVE AT KILLING HEPATITIS A VIRUS. Make sure to wash your hands with warm soapy water after using the restroom, changing diapers, and before preparing or eating food.
