ONGOING CONGREGATIONAL GATHERINGS

MAY 19 DURING WORSHIP

Submitted by The Session

On Sunday, February 24th, during worship, we presented our church community's financial status as a part of our ongoing Congregational Gatherings. We explained the current disparity between our income and our expenses with the desire to be open and forthcoming about the challenges that face our faith community. In this meeting, we promised further discussion around the three objectives of 1) diminishing the withdrawals from our savings, 2) using our designated funds effectively and wisely, and 3) increasing opportunities and incentives for individual giving so that the long-term viability of our congregation's ministry is secure and sustainable.

On Sunday, May 19th during the service, we will meet again for this discussion; and, this time, we will need your help. Previously, the Session simply presented to the congregation a synopsis of where we are financially. Now, we want to have an **informed** discussion involving **all of the congregation**. "All of the congregation" means all those who consider First Presbyterian Church their faith community, regardless of membership status. "Informed" means that both the Session and the Congregation will need to be equal in knowledge when we come together for the discussion. This means we need to know each other's questions so that together we can find answers. We also need to share our ideas of how to approach these challenges and consider how each of us can help move this community toward this goal of a long-term viable ministry which is both secure and sustainable.

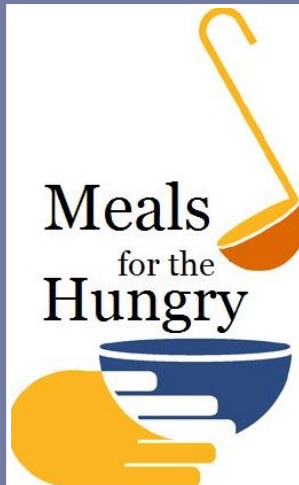

- Christ Community Church delivered beds on March 31 on their “Love Shelbyville” Sunday.
- A Walmart grant application is in the works.
- Upcoming events are June 12 with Kendra Scott Gives Back and Dining for a Cause at Le Moo.
- Gary (and Mary) Steinhilber assembled the latest blanket.

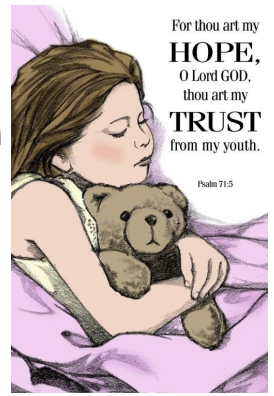

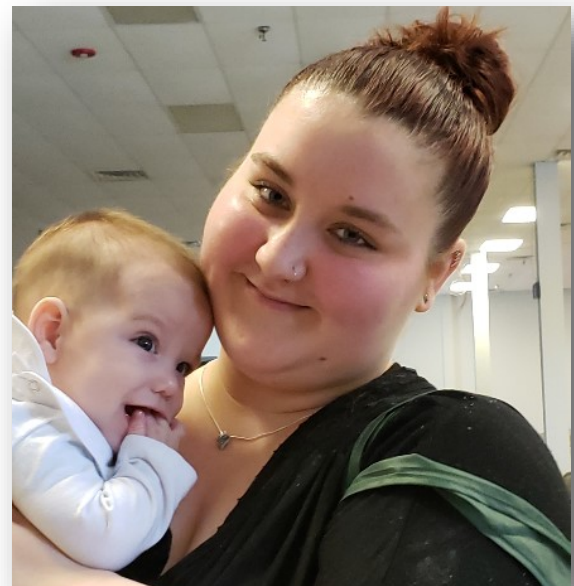


SHELBY COUNTY COMMUNITY BABY SHOWER

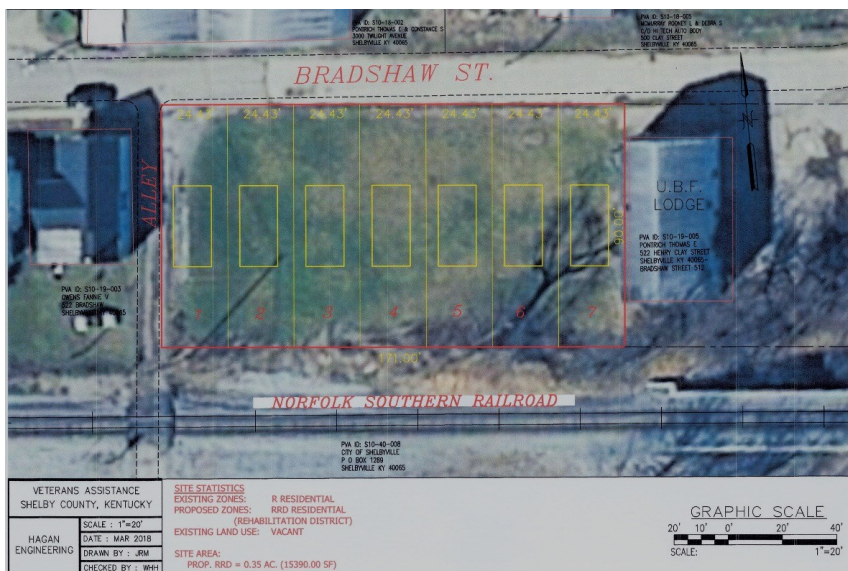
Let's Build A Village

Shelby County's Rural Veterans Outreach Program is becoming part of the solution when it comes to supporting those who took the oath for our country. Determined to make a difference in the lives of homeless veterans, RVO recently purchased property to build a specialized community of 7 transitional tiny homes on the south side of Bradshaw Street between 5th and 6th Streets in Shelbyville. Each tiny home will be a 1-bedroom, 1-bath house that is approximately 12 ft wide and 30 ft deep with a 6 ft front porch.

Modeled much like the Veterans Community Project in Kansas City, Missouri, the village provides the veterans with privacy, a sense of security, and the ability to reintegrate at a comfortable pace. It also allows them to connect with other veterans who can relate to and understand their experiences.

Currently serving 45 veterans, RVO is dedicated to meeting the immediate needs of our local heroes and providing housing with dignity - a task accomplished by the community for the community. ***"The veterans of our military services have put their lives on the line to protect the freedoms we enjoy. They have dedicated their lives to their country and deserve to be recognized for their commitment."*** - Judd Gregg -
