#### REMEMBERING THOSE WHO HAVE GONE BEFORE

All Saints' Day is a time to rejoice in all who through the ages have faithfully served the Lord. The day reminds us that we are part of one continuing, living communion of saints. It is a time to claim our kinship with the "glorious company of apostles ... the noble fellowship of prophets ... the white-robed army of martyrs" (Te Deum). It is a time to express our gratitude for all who in ages of darkness kept the faith, for those who have taken the gospel to the ends of the earth, for prophetic voices who have called the church to be faithful in life and service, for all who have witnessed to God's justice and peace in every nation.

To rejoice with all the faithful of every generation expands our awareness of a great company of witnesses above and around us like a cloud (Hebrews 12:1). It lifts us out of a preoccupation with our own immediate situation and the discouragements of the present. In the knowledge that others have persevered, we are encouraged to endure against all odds (Hebrews 12:1-2). Reminded that God was with the faithful of the past, we are reassured that God is with us today, moving us and all creation toward God's end in time. In this context, it is appropriate for a congregation on All Saints' Day to commemorate the lives of those who died during the previous year.

Mexican culture celebrates a similar day of remembering those who came before, *el dia de muertos*. The **Day of the Dead** is a Mexican holiday celebrated throughout Mexico, in particular the Central and South regions, and by people of Mexican heritage elsewhere. The multi-day holiday involves family and friends gathering to pray for and remember friends and family members who have died, and helping support their spiritual journey. In Mexican culture, death is viewed as a natural part of the human cycle. Mexicans view it not as a day of sadness but as a day of celebration because their loved ones awake and celebrate with them.

Prior to Spanish colonization in the 16th century, the celebration took place at the beginning of summer. Gradually, it was associated with October 31, November 1, and November 2 to coincide with the Western Christian triduum of Allhallowtide: All Saints' Eve, All Saints' Day, and All Souls' Day. Traditions connected with the holiday include building private altars called *ofrendas*, honoring the deceased using calaveras, aztec marigolds, and the favorite foods and beverages of the departed, and visiting graves with these as gifts. Visitors also leave possessions of the deceased at the graves.



Día de Muertos is observed because the Mexican government made it a national holiday based on educational policies from the 1960s; it has introduced this holiday as a unifying national tradition based on indigenous traditions. Holding on to and sharing the memories of lost loved ones keeps their spirit alive. If the memories are forgotten, their spirit disappears.

What a wonderful way to honor one's past and share memories and history with younger generations. What and how will your family and friends remember you? What items would they place on the "ofrendas", recalling them as your favorites? What stories will they tell? In who's faith journey will you continue to be a part?

#### A Place to Sleep

222 children have received beds in 2019 making a total of 1,948 children having received beds with 31+ on the waiting list.

The Shelby County High School National Honor Society will be organizing the warehouse on Friday, October 18.

There will be a Halloween Party at Talon Winery, Shelbyville on October 26. At that time, Dr. Carlen Pippin will be honored by the AARP as Volunteer of the Year.

Christ Community Churches in Shelbyville and Henry County continue to deliver beds on their "Love Shelbyville" Sunday.

#### Give a Kid a Brighter Day

Cadence Collins is collecting Halloween costumes to distribute.

#### Serenity Center

This church continues to volunteer at the Serenity Center on 7<sup>th</sup> Street the first Wednesday of each month. An age limit has been placed on volunteers. Carlen Pippin has been sharing extra food with God's Kitchen, Colonial Hall, and the Women's Renaissance Center.

#### **Musical Instrument Ministry**

115 donated instruments have been placed in the local schools to date.
